"Arendt responds to ... the light of the public that obscures everything ... 'incomprehensible triviality'...

Four Prejudices talk:

"Liberalism opposes and suppresses the coarser elements of democratic freedom.

...Politics is that centripetal force, a magnetic or charismatic center, around which a diverse and chaotic multitude gathers and is held together. And the politician is that person who speaks or acts in such a way as to enable the people to say what they share in common in spite of their di erences. Arendt on Crisis: "The opportunity provided by the very fact of crisis— which tears away facades and obliterates prejudices —[is] to explore and inquire into whatever has been laid bare of the essence of the matter.... A crisis forces us back to the questions themselves and requires from us either new or old answers, but in any case direct judgments. A crisis becomes a disaster only when we respond to it with preformed judgments, that is, with prejudices.' Prejudice 1: democracy by its very nature is liberal

Prejudice 2: collectivist nationalism is 'bad'.

Prejudice 3: Political antagonists are evil.

Prejudice 4: Preference for security over freedom.

Arendt: "Underlying our prejudices against politics today are hope and fear: the fear that humanity could destroy itself through politics and through the means of force now at its disposal, and linked with this fear, the hope that humanity will come to its senses and rid the world, not of humankind, but of politics. It could do so through a world government that transforms the state into an administrative machine, resolves political con icts bureaucratically, and replaces armies with police forces."

Arendt: Bureaucratic crisis: "Representative government is in crisis today, partly because it has lost, in the course of time, all institutions that permitted the citizens' actual participation, and partly because it is now gravely a ected by the disease from which the party system su ers: bureaucratization and the two parties' tendency to represent nobody except the party machines.

Civil disobedience is an act of citizenship by which minorities can change the minds of majorities. Thus, disobedient minorities—those groups who collectively dissent from majority opinion—are not traitors or rebels, but are part of the fabric of democratic government.

You don't build a campaign of prejudice out of thin air. It has to be rooted in the culture. So you start out with a rhetoric of us versus them: We're good; they're bad. We're going to save America; they're going to destroy it. Then you take all the problems of society and blame them on a scapegoat. In Germany it was the Jews. In India today the conservative Hindu groups blame the Muslims. So you pick a group that's already resented, and you blame them and demonize them. They're not just bad; they're evil. In some cases this involves religious beliefs.

Once you've done the demonization and the scapegoating, you come up with conspiracy theories that portray "them" as dangerous enough to hurt "us." And then the final question is: "Why should we wait for them to attack? Let's get them before they get us."

There is a maxim in sociology called the "Thomas Theorem," which says that situations defined as real are real in their consequences. If you believe something to be true, you're going to act on it. Even the wildest belief can lead people to act not just in voting booths but with guns.

Glenn Beck. Ten years ago no one had ever heard of him. What's his background?

Berlet: He comes out of a religious, paranoid conspiracy culture

There's also a double standard in coverage of violence on the Left versus violence on the Right. Violence on the Right is always unfortunate or understandable or maybe crazy, whereas if somebody on the Left throws a brick through a window of a shop, it's terrorism.

The Right has maintained a massive network of corporate and philosophical foundations that pulls the Republican Party to the right. Liberals do not fund a similar network on the Left. They tend to fund band-aid fixes. Liberal foundations will say, "We fund activists, not media and conferences and think tanks." But activists without direction and without ideology are at a loss to confront the right-wing activists who have a road map drawn up for them.

"cruel optimism referred to "when something you desire is actually an obstacle to your flourishing...the tools we depend on to achieve "the good life" — a safety net, job security, the meritocracy, even "durable intimacy" in our romantic lives — have degenerated into "fantasies" that bear "less and less relation to how people can live.'

Berlet:

Weimar Germany in the 1920s and 1930s comes to mind, as political theorist Noam Chomsky has observed. The political scene was gridlocked, and there was talk about the destruction of the nation of Germany. There was a point when many middle-class, moderate voters — the "burghers," they were called — were so fed up with the system and so surrounded with conspiracy theories about the collapse of the country that they voted for Hitler, not because they liked the National Socialists but because they had just had enough.

When a large group of people who already have excess power and privilege become afraid the government and minorities will take away their power, that's an explosive situation. Moderate voters begin to vote to overturn the system just to shake things up.

when you build a major social movement around scapegoating and resentment, things can move quickly in a bad direction.

The creative potential of the psychedelics lies in the fact that they change one's relation to one's self....

—an unhabitual, unified and undistorted "new look" which is the basis of the creative capacity and the problem-solving ability which the authors have clearly described and carefully documented.

The transcendent process also lies at the core of the therapeutic use of the psychedelics. When the defense mechanisms are obviated, one sees one's self objectively. One is, as it were, emotionally naked to one's own gaze. This is the confrontation of the self with no means left to defend against one's own scrutiny and one's own enmity. This is the crux of the process which transforms the value system and hence the man. In this defenseless and indefensible state one cannot fight, and surrender alone is possible. In this case it is self-surrender—a process which leads to being "born again" or of "finding" one's self. It is the final and ultimate acceptance of reality, including the self, as it is in essence. In this way one learns to accept the self; to be content to be one's self and to find one's self an object of his own compassion. The importance of this process is evidenced in that our self-concept conditions our thinking. It makes us respond with trust, understanding, love-and affection or, conversely, with suspicion, prejudice and hostility toward ourselves and toward others....

The psychedelics, by inducing these levels of consciousness which are vast extensions and enlargements of normal experience, provide a microscope for the psychologist through which the details of structure and function of personality can be clearly observed.

discoveries are made by men, not merely by minds, so that they are alive and charged with individuality.

Unlike a lecture or a cinema show, television is not directed to crowds. It is addressed to two or three people in a room,

this series presents a philosophy rather than a history, and a philosophy of nature rather than of science.

There cannot be a philosophy, there cannot even be a decent science, without humanity. I hope that sense of affirmation is manifest in this book. For me. the understanding of nature has as its goal the understanding of human nature, and of the human condition within nature.

Man is a singular creature. He has a set of gifts which make him unique among the animals: so that, unlike them, he is not a figure in the landscape—he is a shaper of the landscape. In body and in

mind he is the explorer of nature, the ubiquitous animal, who did not find but has made his home in every continent.

Among the multitude of animals which scamper, fly, burrow and swim around us, man is the only one who is not locked into his environment. His imagination, his reason, his emotional subtlety and toughness, make it possible for him not to accept the environment but to change it.

...that series of inventions, by which man from age to age has remade his environment, is a different kind of evolution–not biological, but cultural evolution.

I call that brilliant sequence of cultural peaks The Ascent of Man.

The believers in a republic have large but limited faith in the character and judgment of the people and erect institutions and barriers to improve that character and guide that judgment.

The first citizens of this country erected institutions to protect themselves from their own shortcomings

The democratic triumph has created a nation that runs up huge debt and is increasingly incapable of finding a balance between competing interests. Today, the country faces three intertwined economic challenges. We have to make the welfare state fiscally sustainable. We have to do it in a way that preserves the economic dynamism in the country — that provides incentives for creative destruction. We also have to do it in a way that preserves social cohesion — that reduces the growing economic and lifestyle gaps between the educated and less educated.

Octavia Butler:

I got my idea for the Xenogenesis books... from Ronald Reagan because he was advocating this kind of thing. I thought there must be something basic, something really genetically wrong with us if we're falling for this stuff [winning a nuclear war]....

"The illness, if it was an illness, had cut even the living off from one another. As it swept over the country, people hardly had time to lay blame on the Soviets (athough they were falling silent along with the rest of the world), on a new virus, a new pollutant, radiation, divine retribution...The illness was stroke-swift in the way it cut people down and strokelike in some of its effects. But it was highly specific. Language was always lost or severely impaired. It was never regained. Often there was also paralysis, intellectual impairment, death."
